Chair Lattimore called the retreat to order at 9:02 a.m. and welcomed GTC board members, staff, the GT Foundation board members, and guests. Chair Lattimore announced that the press had been notified of the meeting in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act. Chair Lattimore

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acknowledged that the agenda was posted on the GTC website, and a quorum of board members was present.

Mr. Sudduth, chair of the Greenville Tech Foundation Board, provided a welcome and kudos to both boards and the staff for their contributions to the community and the students. Chair Sudduth stated that the Foundation has been looking forward to an opportunity to meet with college leadership and the Area Commission to learn more about how the Foundation can raise money that strategically aligns with the needs of the college. Mr. Sudduth stated that the Foundation is also working to better tell the college's story.

President Miller expressed his thanks to both boards and staff for making the time to attend the joint retreat and addressed various logistics for the day.

Finance Report

Ms. DiMaggio provided the financial report and an update on campus transformation.

Ms. Wright added that the Foundation has set up tours of the new Prisma Health Center for Health & Life Sciences building in March, April, and May for the Foundation Board and extended the invitation to the GTC Board.

Strategic Plan Update

Dr. Larry Miller provided an update on teaching and learning. There was a brief discussion on Artificial Intelligence and what the college is doing in that area.

Dr. Knowles and Ms. Wright provided an update on student success. There was a brief discussion on new FAFSA regulations and how the college will help students navigate through those unique situations.

Ms. Jones provided an update on employee support and development.

Ms. Simer provided an update on operational excellence and accountability. Related to the rebranding and logo refresh, each attendee received a swag bag containing items with the new logo.

After a brief break, the retreat continued with key institutional initiatives.

Institutional Initiatives

Ms. Wright provided a Greenville Tech Foundation overview. She mentioned that the greatest need for donations is student emergency needs and donations to the food bank. Housing/rent is a big concern for students. There was a brief discussion referencing a recent Foundation governance study on how to function best as a successful board. The Foundation donor appreciation event is on April 18, 2024, from 4:30 p.m. until 6:30 p.m. at the Center for Manufacturing Innovation.

Ms. Eddy provided an update on the 4DX initiative. The college was awarded the 2023 Franklin Covey Greatness Award, the first educational institution to receive the award.

Mr. George Abraham, chief information officer, provided an update on cybersecurity at the college. The college's goal is to build a robust Security Operations Center (SOC) with one or two full-time employees and incorporate students from the college's cybersecurity program. This will be modeled after a similar program at the University of South Carolina.

Dr. Larry Miller provided an update on the Complete College America initiative, which is aimed at transforming the student experience.

Dr. Larry Miller provided an overview of the universal transfer agreement signed by the presidents of Clemson University, the University of South Carolina, and the technical colleges. This is a positive step toward full statewide transfer between public two-year and four-year institutions.

President Miller provided an overview of the McAlister development plan, specific objectives, and general information about the mall property. Mr. Shouse chairs the McAlister Study Committee. Updates will be provided to both the GTC Board and the Foundation Board as progress is made.

South Carolina Association of Technical College Commissioners (SCATCC)

Mr. Shouse provided an overview of SCATCC.

- Comprised of the sixteen South Carolina technical colleges commissioners.
- Named SCATCC because of its national affiliation with the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT).
- Funded by the colleges on a pro-rata basis.
- Hire a lobbyist to approach the legislature on behalf of the South Carolina technical education system for educational funding and program improvements.
- Provide training for new South Carolina commissioners annually in February at a Day of Learning.
- Participate at the national level in the ACCT conference and legislative conference.

Commission on Higher Education (CHE)

Mr. Batson provided an overview and update on CHE.

- South Carolina Commission on Higher Education
- Three objectives: 1) improve access and affordability for all students in South Carolina; 2) implement and regulate policies and statutes passed by the General Assembly; 3) vet finance of all institutions' proposed facilities projects and academic programs.
- Comprised of district appointees appointed by the governor and by the General Assembly, a representative from the R1 institutions, one representative for the comprehensive colleges, one representative for all sixteen technical colleges (Mr. Batson), and a very strong committee system (Mr. Batson chairs the Finance and Facilities Committee and also serves on the Access and Equity Committee).
- Two current issues: 1) a report compiled by the State Inspector General that was strongly critical of certain practices in the management of CHE which led to an intensive study by the Commission; and 2) Dr. Monhollon's retirement as president and executive director. The Executive Committee, which Mr. Batson serves on, has been on a search for an interim director and a decision will be made by Friday, February 23, 2024.
- There will be another series of actions to be taken on the recommendations made by the State Inspector General about the allocation of funds and other issues.

President Miller announced that after lunch the Foundation Board members, except for Mr. Sudduth, and the staff exit so the Area Commission could go into Executive Session.

Old and New Business

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Mr. Batson made a motion to go into executive session to discuss personnel and compensation matters. Mr. Shouse seconded the motion. The Area Commission and Mr. Sudduth entered into executive session at 12:19 p.m.

Executive Session

The board reconvened at 1:00 p.m. with no action taken in executive session.

Mr. Stafford made a motion to accept President Miller's letter of retirement. Mr. Martin seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The meeting adjourned at 1:10 p.m.

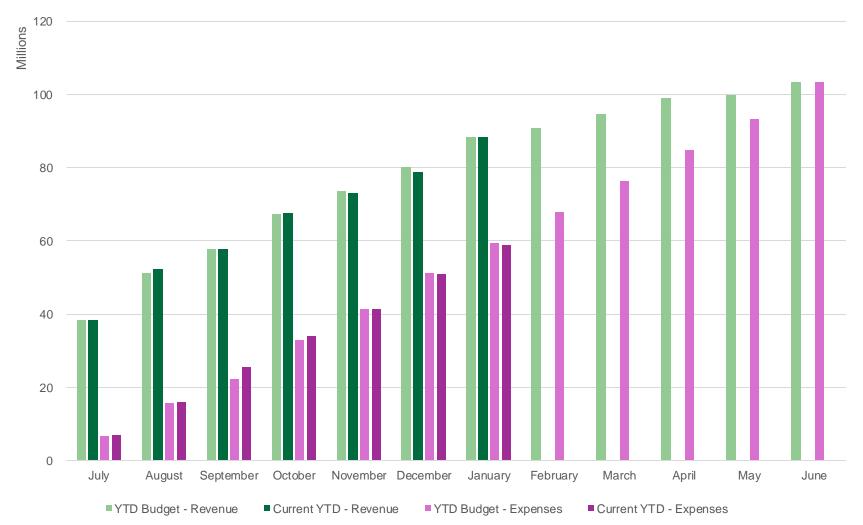

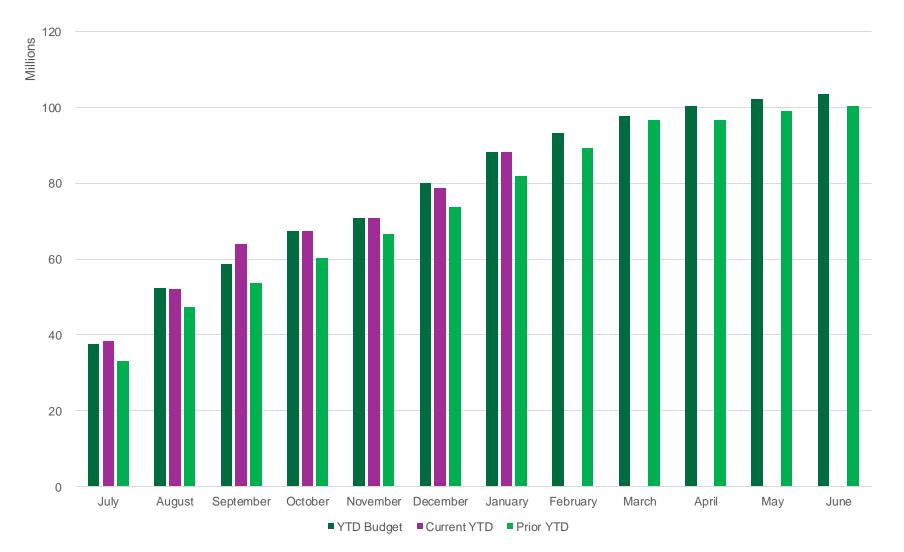

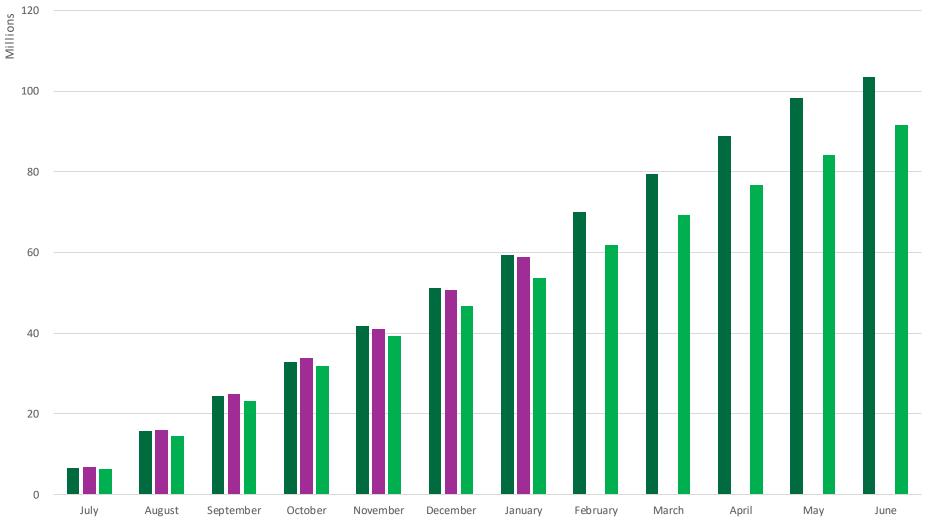
Budgeted and YTD Revenues and Expenses



Revenues by Month

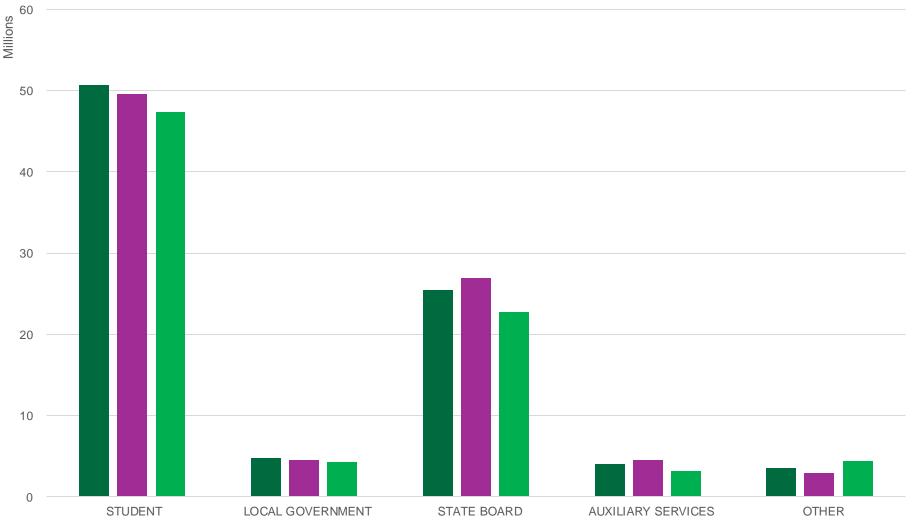


EXPENSES BY MONTH



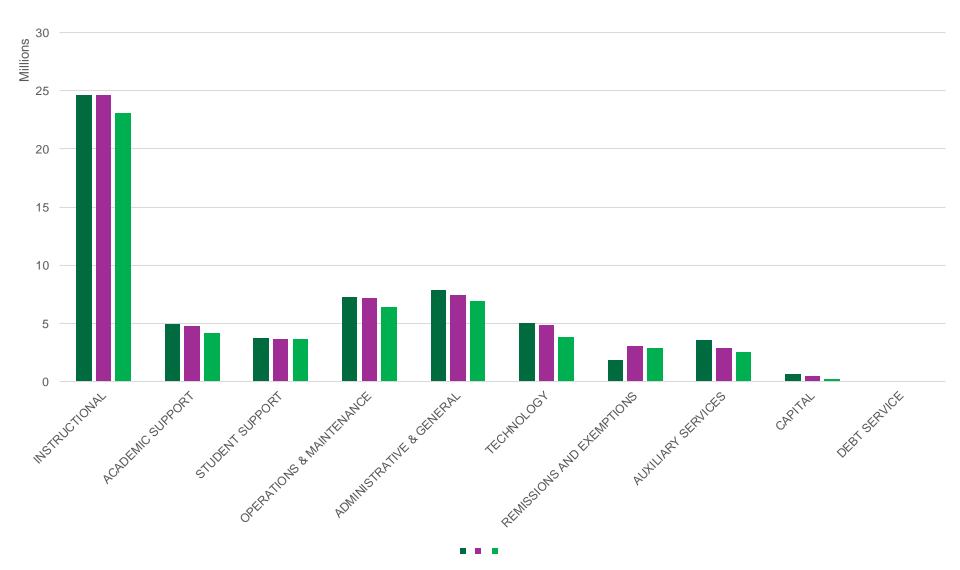

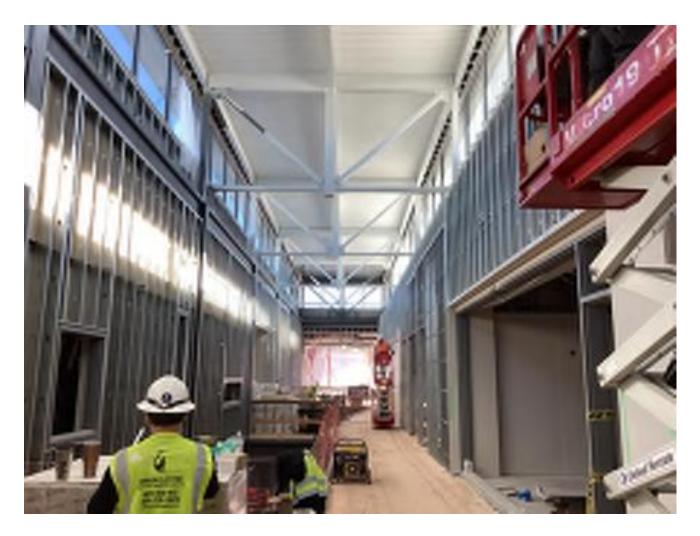


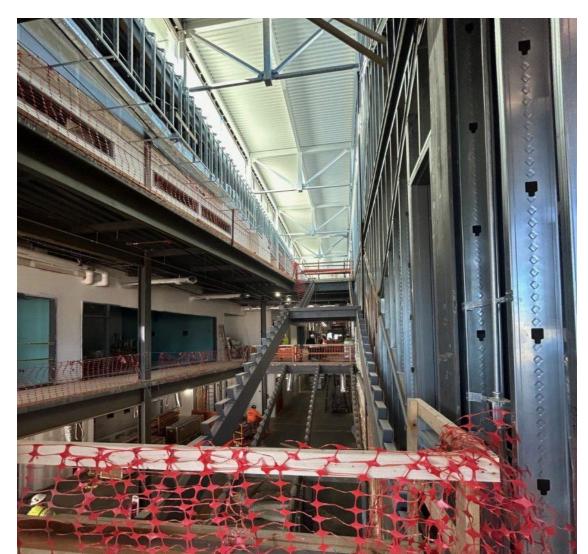




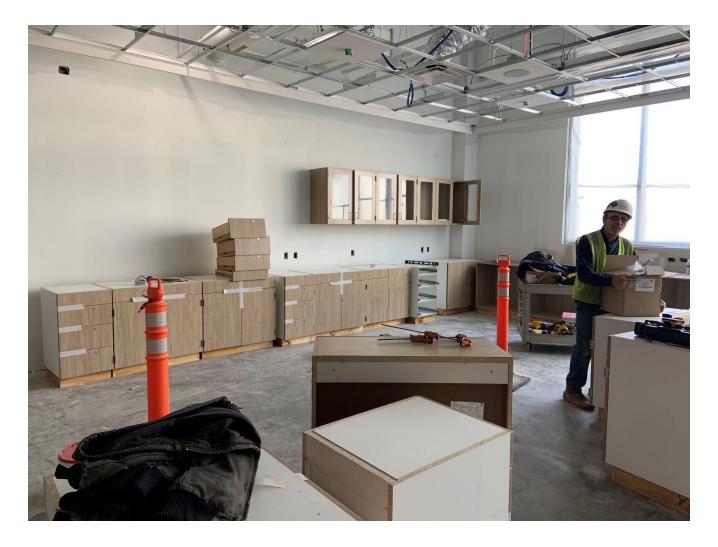


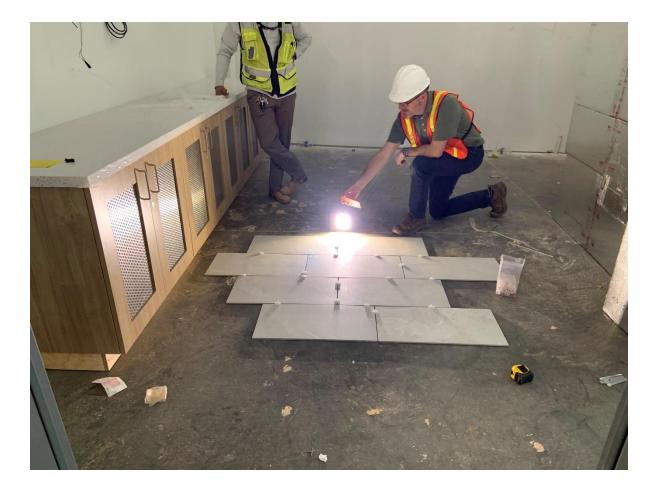






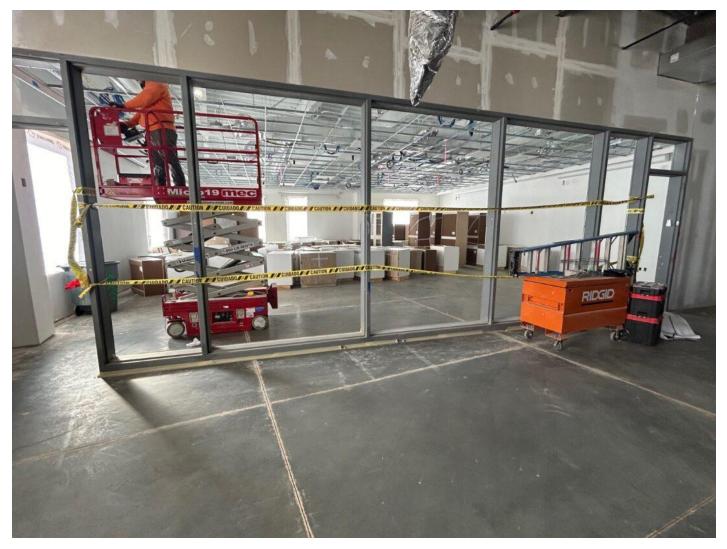


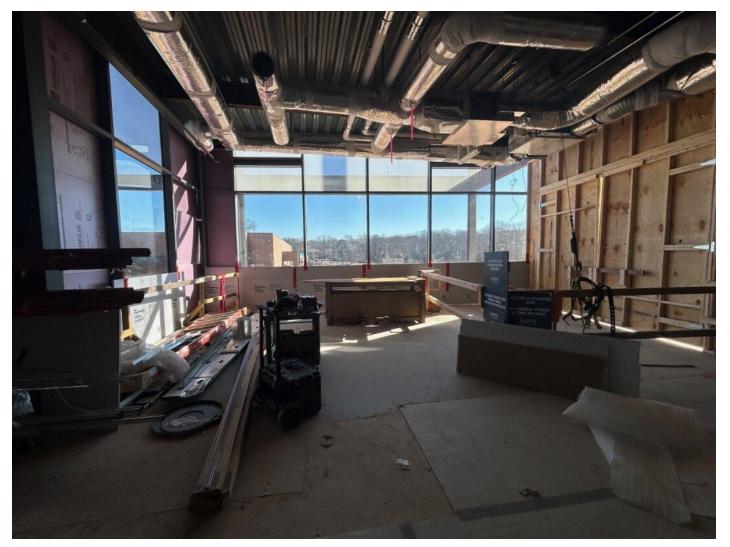


















Center for Child Development

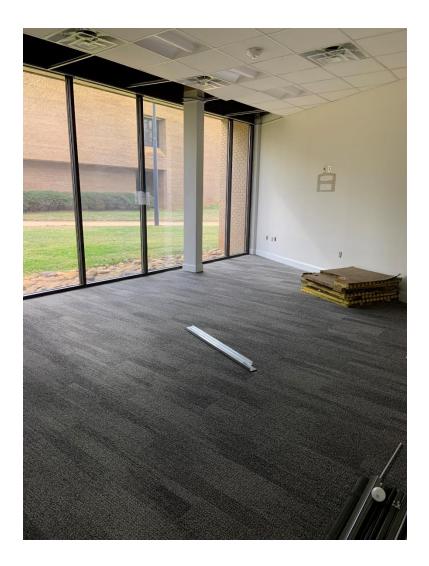

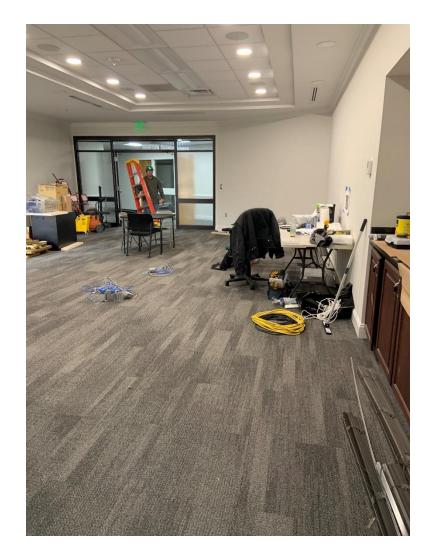
Renovation of Administration Building

Ongoing Projects

The Campus Security Project is underway

- This will allow immediate lockdown of buildings, electronic access when the college is not open, and internal and external cameras
- Cost: \$2 million

The Wayfinding Project is underway

- This will replace signage and improve wayfinding across the Barton Campus
- Cost: \$250,000

Future projects

Center for Workforce Development – Brashier Campus

- \$15 million appropriated from the state for a state-of-the-art welding facility
- Benchmarking trips are on-going
- Phase I has been approved by the state
- Phase II approval expected late 2024
- Groundbreaking early 2025

Center for Cyber Security and Analytics

- Appropriation request submitted to General Assembly
- Preliminary plans for curriculum and building design in process
 The Nursing, Dental Buildings and the STAT Center are scheduled for renovations

MAJOR PROJECT SUMMARY - February 2024

FY 23-25 - New ERP System \$7.0 million (two-year project totaling \$7.0 million)

FY 23-25 – Prisma Health Center for Health & Life Sciences \$70.0 million \$4.0 million from cash reserves (\$6.0 from Buck Mickel Center) and \$60.0 million of bonds

FY 23-25 – Campus Security Upgrade \$2.0 million (two-year project totaling \$2.0 million from operating budget),

FY 24-25 – Center for Workforce Development \$15 million - state appropriations

FY 24-25 - decommission UT and replace with the Center for Analytics and Cyber Security \$35.0 million - \$10.0 million cash reserves, \$25 million state-funded either appropriated or infrastructure bonds

FY 24-25 - Possible decommission of Industrial Complex

FY 25-26 - ET renovation to be determined

Small renovation and maintenance projects are ongoing.

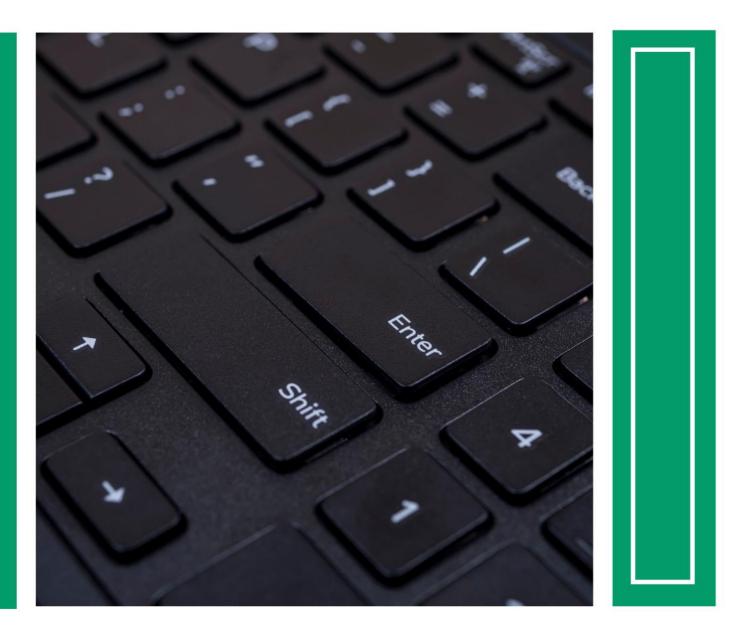

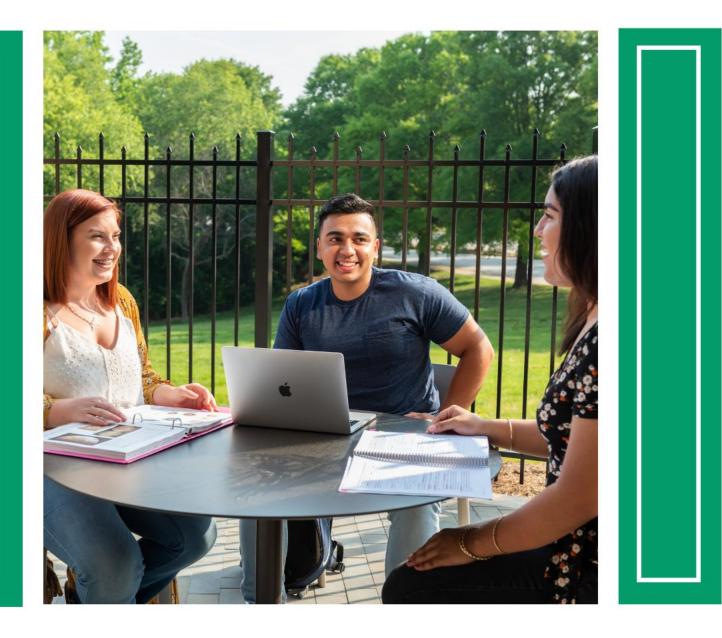

McAlister Development Plan



Specific Objectives

1) Determine best and most efficient future and long-term use of McAlister Square for the college and Foundation

2) Design a plan complementary of the missions of the college and Foundation, enhancing the Square as a community asset

3) Grow revenue stream of the college and Foundation

GTF possesses approximately 134,000 square feet of non-anchor space, along with the common "mall space" area – with a 90% occupancy rate

GTC owns approximately 250,000 square feet within the anchor tenants' spaces – with a 75% occupancy rate

"Mall" property is owned free and clear of any debt

Strategic location – less than 3 miles from downtown Greenville – adjacent to some of the city's most coveted residential areas (Parkins Mill and Gower)

Average household income within a 3 mile radius = \$112,022

Population within a 5 mile radius = 174,791

Extremely challenging and restrictive covenants set by Publix

GVL2040 – the City of Greenville's Comprehensive Plan to shape the growth and evolution over the next 40 years

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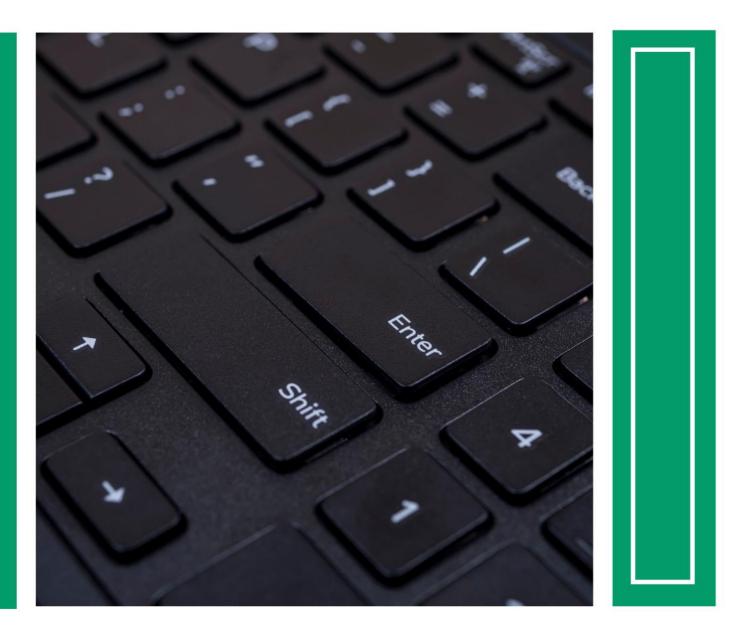
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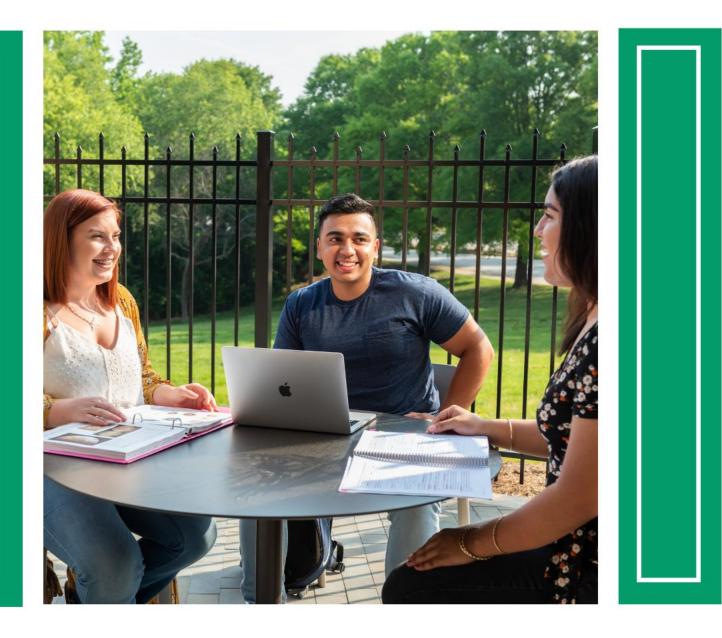
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
